A FRIENDLY REMINDER ABOUT WILDFIRE SAFETY

1. Continue to monitor wildfire activity on the Douglas County wildfire information map.

2. Be prepared and continue to monitor evacuation reports from the [Douglas County Sheriff's Office](http://www.dco.com/EVACUATIONS) at [https://www.dco.com/EVACUATIONS](http://www.dco.com/EVACUATIONS)
3. Evacuate if there is an order from the Douglas County Sheriff's Office.
4. Monitor air quality reports on sites such as AirNow or Oregon Air.

5. If air quality is unhealthy, stay indoors and keep windows and doors closed, run your air conditioner and air filtration systems if you have them.
6. Limit outdoor activities when the air is unhealthy.
7. If you are experiencing severe breathing problems or other medical issues, contact your physician or seek care at a local Urgent Care Clinic or for more urgent medical matters call 9-1-1 or go right away to an emergency department at a hospital.

AIR QUALITY INFORMATION

Due to wildfires in our area, we have been experiencing a high volume of smoke in our area. The air quality index (AQI) has been fluctuating between good and hazardous range in the past few weeks. **Currently it sits at an AQI of 15 (Good) as of 3:00 pm today, Wednesday, September 13, 2023, for the Roseburg, Oregon area.** Please continue to monitor air quality throughout the day, as it can change quickly. If it reaches unhealthy range or above everyone should try to limit physical outdoor activities, especially those with heart or lung disease, older adults, children, and teens. ALL CURRENT EVACUATIONS FOR TYEE RIDGE COMPLEX FIRE

Local wildfire evacuations are managed and administered by the Douglas County Sheriff's Office (DCSO). If you have questions, please contact DCSO at (541) 440-4463. Please monitor the interactive evacuation map at www.dcsso.com/evacuations for the most up-to-date information. **Please see DCSO's updated evacuation orders for the Tyee Ridge Complex Fires as of 12:00 pm on Monday, September 11, 2023. Currently there are NO Level 3 – Go Now! or Level 2 – Be Set! evacuation notices at this time. If you do not see your address listed, then you do not have an active evacuation notice for your residence or street.**

LEVEL 1 - BE READY!

- 11000-block of Hubbard Creek Road to the 9300-block of Hubbard Creek Road, including all addresses between these two points.
- All homes on Briarwood Road

Any residence that has previously been under an evacuation level and is not listed above, is no longer under an official evacuation notice. A current evacuation map can be found at www.dcsso.com/evacuations.

This may be the only notice you receive. Don't wait to evacuate if you feel unsafe. If conditions change, you may receive a Level 3 - GO NOW! evacuation notice. You do not need to wait for another evacuation notice. Make the best decision for your safety.

Level 1 - BE READY TO EVACUATE MEANS

- Be aware of danger in your area and stay informed.
- Check local city and county websites, social media, TV, and radio for updates.

- View and monitor the interactive evacuation map at www.dcsso.com/evacuations.
- Make plans and prepare to evacuate. Gather necessary supplies for health, safety, and identification.
- Act early if you are older, have children, disabilities, or limited access to transportation.
- Consider moving pets and livestock early.
- Plan possible evacuation routes. Use www.TripCheck.com or call 511 for the latest road closure information.
- If you can do so safely, check with your neighbors and share information. Ask for help if you need it. Offer help if you can give it.

All residents who have been placed on any level of evacuation notice should continue to monitor official sources for updated information. Any changes to these evacuation notices or danger levels will be communicated through official channels. This change is a result of progress made by firefighters around the structures in the fire area and based on immediate public safety needs.

SAFETY INFORMATION FROM DCSO FOR RESIDENTS IN FIRE AREAS:

Residents living near active fire areas, should be aware that danger still exists in the area and should remain ready to leave at a moment's notice. Individuals returning to areas impacted by the fire should be aware there are inherent risks associated with returning. Hazards have not been mitigated from private properties and homeowners assume all risks by returning to their properties. If at any time a resident feels unsafe or in the event of increased fire behavior, significant wind, or rain, they should not wait to be told to leave and should do so on their own. The following safety tips are provided to those returning to areas which have been impacted by the fire:

LOOK UP:

- **TRAFFIC:** Firefighters are NOT used to having the Hubbard Creek Road beyond Briarwood Road open to public use. PLEASE drive slowly for their safety and yours. Firefighting equipment, large equipment and personnel should be expected in the roadway. Patrol deputies will be enforcing reduced speed limits in the area.
- Reduced visibility due to smoke and dust should be expected.
- **BURNED TREES:** Trees that have been burned are now very weak. Do not park or stand under burned trees.
- **GREEN TREES:** Even green healthy-looking trees can have their roots burned which can make them fall.

LOOK DOWN:

- **SEPTIC TANKS / CULVERTS:** The fire can burn underground septic tanks and culverts, but they can look "normal" above ground. Be careful when walking as the ground over these can be weakened and you could fall through. DO NOT PARK OVER SEPTIC SYSTEMS.
- **DOWNED WIRES:** Power lines should be de-energized. Still be careful as they can get tangled in vehicles.
- **SMOKING / SMOLDERING MATERIAL:** Logs, stumps, and other burned material in the fire may still be smoldering or burning. Watch for ash pits or holes created by burned trees and debris. These can be filled with hot ash that can be dangerous to persons or animals.

LOOK AROUND:

- **FIRES:** Fires may flare up without warning. Should you see flame or heavy smoke, do not assume that fire authorities are aware it. Residents will likely observe hot spots or smoke when returning.
- **WIND:** If the wind increases this can bring trees and branches down. Wind can also increase the movement of the fire. If it gets windy, you should leave the area.
- **RAIN:** Heavy rainfall can cause rocks, logs, dirt and other debris to slide down hillsides.
- **WILD ANIMALS:** Animals may be showing unusual behavior. They have been displaced, too, and could be looking for food or water.
- **PERSONAL SAFETY:** Your house and yard may be covered in ash. There may still be live embers present. Wear long pants, a long-sleeved shirt or a jacket, and boots. Wearing a dust mask will be especially important.

Smoke levels can be at hazardous levels, specifically near the fires edge. The fire management team will be posting daily smoke reports to their Tye Complex Facebook page.

HUBBARD CREEK ROAD CLOSURE & BLM CLOSURE

A road closure continues for Hubbard Creek Road at Briarwood Road to the general public. ONLY Residents who can show proof of residency beyond the closure will be permitted through the area but expect delays and slow moving traffic. Community members are encouraged to avoid unnecessary travel near the area for firefighter and public safety. If travel is necessary, please reduce speeds and be aware of personnel, vehicles, and equipment in or around the roadway. Please obey all road closure signs and postings.

RED CROSS SHELTER – CLOSED SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 2, 2023, AT 12 PM

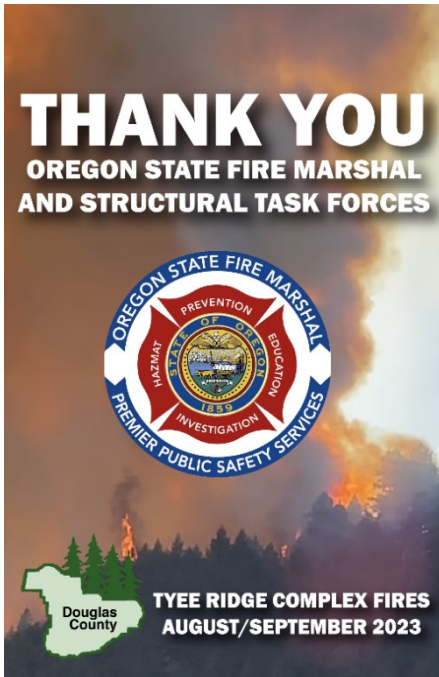

THANK YOU OSFM!

Douglas County was significantly impacted by a large weather event on August 24, 2023, when several lightning strikes resulted in 19 wildfires in NW Douglas County now known as the Tye Ridge Complex Fires.

The Douglas County Commissioners would like to extend their sincere appreciation for the amazing work done by the Oregon State Fire Marshal (OSFM), Mariana Ruiz-Temple, OSFM Red Team Incident Commander, Ian Yocum and OSFM structural task forces that responded to the Tye Ridge Complex Fires in Douglas County in late August/September this year. The OSFM Red Team & additional OSFM Structural Task Forces arrived following a conflagration declaration made by the state after Douglas County Fire District #2 Chief, Rob Bullock and the Douglas County Board of Commissioners submitted an urgent request to OSFM for additional structural fire crews and equipment. OSFM showed up prepared to vigorously protect homes and vital infrastructure in our county with a contingent of 51 structural fire agencies who brought equipment, apparatus, and firefighters from across the state. It's important to understand that the OSFM structural task force is brought in specifically to protect homes and structures during large scale wildfire conflagration events.

OSFM Red Team has been working with the Oregon Department of Forestry - Team 1 (ODF) in a Unified Command structure battling the Tye Ridge Complex Fires since August 25, 2023. ODF Incident Commander, Joe Hessel and his fire crews have been and continue to work on building and maintaining fire lines, suppression, and slowing the forward progression of the fire, while OSFM concentrated their efforts on protecting threatened structures. Having accomplished their task of significantly reducing the fire threat for 164 structures in the Tye Ridge area, OSFM Red Team and OSFM Structural Task Forces were able to return to their home bases on Sunday, September 3, 2023, while ODF - Team 1 continues to battle the Tye Ridge Complex Fires. If the fire danger to these homes and structures increases, we can always request that the OSFM Structural Task Force return. In light of OSFM leaving, ODF Team 1 Incident Commander, Joe Hessel brought in additional crews to continue to monitor and manage structural protection. Big shout out to ODF Team 1 for the great job they are doing in battling this fire. OSFM worked collaboratively with the Douglas County Commissioners, the Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Douglas

Forest Protective Association, Douglas County Fire District #2, Douglas County Emergency Management and Douglas County Public Works to coordinate critical decision making and ensure that there was no loss of life or structures while they were working on the Tye Ridge Complex Fires. We are most thankful for this result. Following OSFM's departure we received the attached letter of thanks from OSFM Red Team Incident Commander, Ian Yocum.

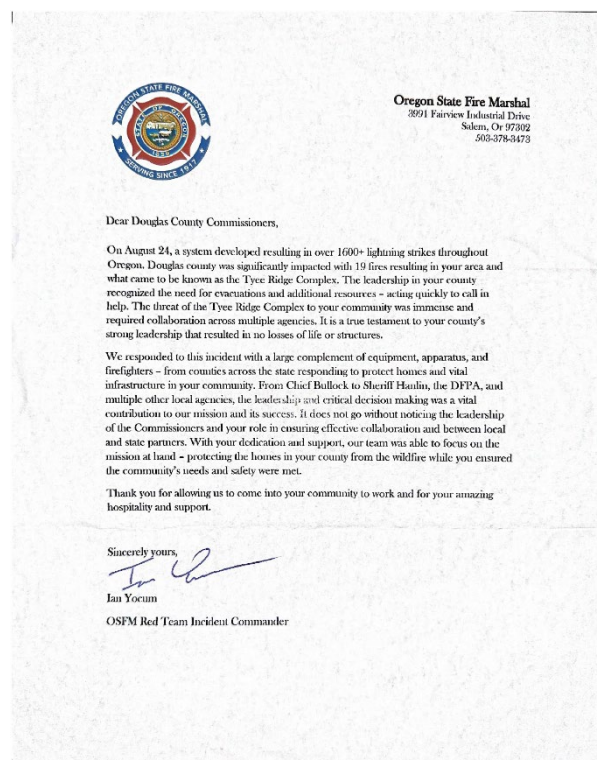
